<u>Task 2:</u> The grid below is a 'tell me grid'. Complete the questions on the grid based on your knowledge and understanding of the story.


<u>Task 3:</u> Now complete the second part of the grid using the image from the story of the varmint peering down from the pod (image below). Think about the following things when completing the grid.
