Look at the **illustration of Pink** from Pink Crayon's letter:

1. Look closely at the illustration of Pink Crayon. Write inferences based on the evidence you can spot in the illustration. Remember to <u>because</u> to give reasons for your ideas.

Here is an idea to get you thinking:

I infer Pink Crayon is complaining about something because she has her arms crossed, her eyes closed and she looks like she's annoyed.

2. Write a short letter to Duncan from Pink Crayon based on your inferences. Remember, you can use your imagination.

Here is an example of a start to a letter:

Dear Duncan,

You never use me to colour in and it's really getting to me now. What have I ever done to you? Is it because you don't like the colour pink? I think you're being very unfair.

- 1. Look closely at the illustration of Pink Crayon. Draw the illustration yourself and label it with words to describe how she might be feeling.
- 2. Write inferences based on the evidence you can spot from the illustration off Pink Crayon. Remember to <u>because</u> to give reasons for your ideas.

Example: I think Pink Crayon is annoyed <u>because</u> she has her arms crossed like she is angry or complaining.
