

**LO: To use a range of sentence types: statement, question and exclamation**

Look carefully at the next two pages from the book.



The bird flying across the garden is a kookaburra- it can only survive where there are native plants and insects for habitat and food.

Look at all the changes in the town.

Can you tell what the relationship is between Tracy and the boy from next door?

Can you predict (before you look) what might happen to Tracy and Tom in the next picture when they are two years older?



What is happening in the street on this day?

How does it make you feel- and why?

You need to look at the activities and choose which is best for you.



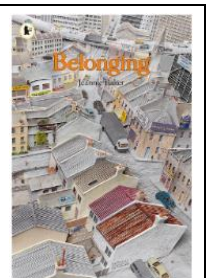
Red hot is for people who want extra challenge.

Skilful writers can recognise the different types of sentence and choose the most suitable to create interest for the reader. They must also remember to end each sentence with the correct punctuation mark.

Task

Write a **statement, question and exclamation** to go with each image- try to extend each sentence beyond the basic by including **conjunctions, adverbs and adjectives**.



Example:

Kookaburras are native birds to Australia and are famous for their call that sounds like a loud laughing noise. (Statement)

What is the kookaburra looking for in Tracey's garden? (Question)

How fantastic that native birds are returning to the city! (Exclamation)

Do not write boring or repetitive sentences.

Exclamations end with exclamation marks.  
Statements end with full-stops.

*What a nice bird the kookaburra is! (Exclamation)*

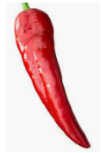
