Life on the Nile



Egypt is surrounded by desert, so the Ancient Egyptians relied on the River Nile to provide fertile land for farming. Every year, the river floods, covering the fields along its banks with water. The floods wash down rich soil from the hills to the south. Ancient Egyptian farmers built ditches and low walls to trap the mud and water, giving them fertile soil to grow crops such as wheat, barley, and vegetables. The whole kingdom depended on the Nile floods. In dry years, many people would starve.

When herding animals across flooded areas, the Egyptians chanted spells to drive away crocodiles.

To the south of Egypt lay a rival kingdom called Nubia. Forts were built by the Nile in this area to keep watch for enemy boats.
