A heading is a main title that helps the reader know what they are reading about.



A **sub-heading** is a title within a piece of writing, that helps the reader know what that section is about.

These are useful ways to organise your writing and make it easy for the reader to locate information. It is most commonly used in non-fiction writing.

Task.

Write an information page about a main character or event in the Twits.

Use headings, sub-headings, pictures and sections of the page to organise the information in a clear way. You might want to use bullet points to list information.

Success Criteria:

- 1. Use **heading** at top of page.
- 2. Include sub-headings at the top of each section.
- 3. Use a **ruler** to make headings stand out from rest of writing
- 4. Use **space and layout** effectively.

Extra challenge (optional):

Choose several main characters or events about which to create information pages.

'Over the ceiling!' they cried. 'Why the ceiling?'




'Never mind why!' shouted Muggle-Wump. 'Just do as you're told and don't argue!'
