Read chapter 25: The Furniture Goes Up

You need to be able to use a/an correctly in your writing.

The rule is simple. If the next word begins with a vowel (a, e, i, o, u) you must use an.

If the next word begins with a consonant (any other letter) you must use a.

Example: an egg a bicycle

e is a vowel b is a consonant

Task.

Complete the table with a or an (two have been done to show you).

a beautiful bird	gruesome bird pie	dead tree
an unkind trick	awful woman	disgusting man
upside down trick	open cage	ugly house
excellent plan	trap	excited monkey

Choose at least 6 words to use in sentences with the correct form of a or an.

Example

The Roly-Poly was <u>a</u> beautiful bird with bright feathers trailing behind him.



Success Criteria:

- 1. Use **a** if the next word begins with a consonant.
- 2. Use **an** if the next word begins with a vowel.
- 3. Make sure there are at least two ideas in each sentence joined with a conjunction.
- 4. Every sentence needs to start differently and use powerful language.

Extra challenge (optional):

Try to include the 'power of three' to describe, and a colon to introduce a list.

The Furniture Goes Up



'It's the strongest glue in the world!' Muggle-Wump replied. 'It's the special bird-catching bird-killing glue for smearing on trees!'







