





A clause is the idea contained in a sentence.

A **conjunction** is the word that joins the clauses (ideas) within, or between, sentences and paragraphs.

When we write instructions, the order in which you do things, and how long you do them for, can be very important- and make the difference between success and disaster. We need conjunctions for time: **temporal conjunctions**.

Conjunctions can come at the start of a sentence, or in the middle.

Example:

Firstly, weigh out all your ingredients.

Weigh out all your ingredients then put them in a big bowl.
