Vocabulary

timothy – type of grass which is widely grown for grazing and hay

clover - a plan of the pea family

jubilee – a special anniversary (or time of year in this context)

Frigidaire – refrigerator (fridge)

morals - principles of right and wrong

scruples - a feeling of doubt or hesitation with regard to whether something is right or wrong

milk of rodent kindness – care for others (based on the saying 'milk of human kindness')

compunctions - feelings of guilt that prevent or follow the doing of something bad

anaesthetic - a substance that reduces of removes pain

hysterics – a wildly emotional reaction

Task (with links):

Using the text in chapters 5, 6 and 7, create a character profile spider diagram of Charlotte, focusing on features of her personality.

Success Criteria:

- 2. In the sections around the outside of the web, write words and phrases to describe Charlotte's personality.
- 3. Use the quotations below to remind you what she is like and to help you think of words to describe her.

These quotations from Charlotte will help you to think about the sort of character she is. However, you might find more ideas if you look back through the text of chapters 5, 6 and 7 to read how Wilbur describes her.

Chapter 5

- "I have to get my own living. I live by my wits. I have to be sharp and clever... I have to think things out..."


Chapter 6

- "Fine! Seven is a lucky number."


Chapter 7

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Task (with links):

Using some quotations and an short extract of the text from chapter 5, create a character profile spider diagram of Charlotte, focusing on features of her personality.
