<u>Vocabulary</u>

motionless - unmoving

straddled - sit with one leg on either side

pasture - land covered with grass and other low plants suitable for grazing animals, especially cattle or sheep

jello - jelly

descended – went down

drowsed – doze, be half asleep

TASK:

- 1. To correct punctuation errors in lines of speech.

Success Criteria:

1. Read the sentence out loud.
2. Rewrite it with correct punctuation.
3. Opening speech marks before the first word of speech.
4. Capital letter at the start.
5. Punctuation at the end of the line of speech.

 comma, exclamation mark or question mark if the sentence isn't complete
6. Closing speech mark
Finish the sentence (if necessary) with punctuation.
8. New speaker new line
