



As part of your learning today, you are thinking about the dilemma that the varmint is going through. You'll be using something called **conscience alley** to help him with his problem.

What is Conscience Alley?

This is a technique for exploring any kind of dilemma faced by a character. It provides an opportunity to explore a significant moment in greater detail. Watch this video clip to understand how this works <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=-Hs0LirW9v8> (watch up to 2:16 minutes)

You should try and include a minimum of **6 suggestions or more**.
